Message from the SAHS President

2015 has been a busy year for the Salem Area Historical Society. In addition to our usual meetings, open houses and events, we have added one-day trips. The first trip (Hamburg Historical Museum and Tea Room) was held in June; the second trip (Ypsilanti Automotive Heritage Museum) was held in October; the third trip (Governor Warner Mansion in Farmington) will be on December 9th (See Page 5). A good time was had by all during the first two trips and the third should be no exception. I encourage you to join us for the tour of the mansion which will be decorated for Christmas. Also, there was a members-only Antique Show and Tell with free appraisals in July. Your SAHS Board hopes that you enjoyed this expanded schedule and the social aspect of your SAHS Membership.

Salem Area Historical Society was also the recipient of two unique donations this year. The first was a generous donation from Lee Holland of Northville who wanted to honor his friend Don Riddering, a founding member of SAHS and a long-serving President of SAHS, in a mural. This resulted in a ninemonth effort that concluded in two mural dedication ceremonies; one for the South Salem Stone School Mural and one for the Dickerson Barn Mural (See Page 3). The second was a donation to support a student internship at SAHS. I have begun the process of establishing this internship through the Eastern Michigan University Historic Preservation Program. The student will be working part-time at the Jarvis Stone School and has four major assignments; 1.) Records / Artifacts Review and Cataloguing, 2.) Research and Exhibit Creation for Salem Farming, 3.) Michigan Historic Marker for South Salem Stone School and 4.) SAHS Docent Activity and Training. We received and reviewed three applications and held interviews. A student was selected and will be starting in December. See Page 8 for more on this student internship project.

This issue continues the new series started in the previous issue of excerpts from SAHS Publications. See Page 6. These excerpts will show some of the expert research and writing that is contained in the fourteen SAHS Historical Monographs, which can be purchased using the Publications Order Form on our Website.

Salem Area Historical Murals

On Sunday, September 13th, the Salem Area Historical Society, owners of the Jarvis Stone School Local Historic District, held the South Salem Stone School Mural Dedication, which was well attended by family members of Don Riddering and Irene Lyke, past students and SAHS Members. Thanks to Lee Holland for the donation to SAHS that made the Mural possible and to Gregg Bugala, the Muralist, for the creative effort that resulted in this beautiful mural. The mural honors the school's 110 years (1857-1967) of continuous education to the community, Irene Lyke, who was instrumental in transferring ownership of the school to SAHS, and Don Riddering, who lead the school's restoration effort.



On Wednesday, October 29th, the Dickerson Barn Mural Dedication was held. This second mural, also made possible by the donation from Lee Holland and the artistry of Gregg Bugala, consists of four panels recalling the 1824 to 1900 era of Salem and honors Meroë Allen Kaericher who led the acquisition of the

Dickerson Barn by The Salem Area Historical Society in 1997 and Gilbert Terry who led the team that relocated the barn to SAHS's property in 2007-8. The panels depict the Salem Train Depot, the Salem Hotel, the Salem churches, the Salem schools and the Dickerson Barn.

The Governor Warner Museum in Farmington is a Victorian Italianate structure built in 1867 by P. D. Warner, the Governor's father, and is furnished in late Victorian style. Sitting on almost three acres, the house is surrounded by gardens. The mansion will be decorated for the Christmas Season.

The Governor Warner Museum and Gardens were accepted by the City of Farmington on December 23, 1980 . The Governor's grandchildren, Susan Slocum Klingbeil and William Wanton Slocum, Jr.,

gave the property to the city designing it be used for a Historical Museum. Since that time, the gardens have been planted and maintained by volunteers.

Edessa Warner Slocum, daughter of the Governor, was the last family member to occupy the mansion. She was a charter member of Farmington Garden Club, and an avid gardener. The existing Perennial Garden as well as many other trees and plants were planted by her.

Excerpt from SAHS Publication

Salem Area Historical Society Publication: Salem Township's Other Railroad 1881-1891

On the Washtenaw County map of 1874, you will find that the intersection of Five Mile Road and Pontiac Trail is labeled "Peebles (Pebble) Corners." That village in 1874 included a post office, school, general store, church and cemetery, a thriving agricultural center worth having a railroad service to market. The change in name to "Worden" was brought about because the train station was built around 1881 on the E. S. Worden farm, west of the intersection.

The present owners (in 1988) of the property confirm that their barns were probably part of the railroad shed. One barn blew down three or four years ago (1984-5), and someone came to take pictures because he knew that the barn has been part of the railroad shed. The other barn, still standing (1988), has a black and white bracket, which held the railroad signal.

.....

In 1877, a businessman-politician from Toledo, Ohio started construction of the Ann Arbor Railroad. The Ann Arbor Railroad eventually extended from Toledo, through Ann Arbor, to Owosso, Alma, Mt. Pleasant, Clare, Cadillac, and to the port city of Frankfort in 1889. The completed main line was 291 miles long.

Mr. James M. Ashley, founder and chairman of The Ann Arbor Railroad Co., originally planned to construct a railroad from Toledo, through Ann Arbor, terminating at Pontiac. The Ann Arbor Railroad fundraising prospectus of 1881 said that the railroad was already moving freight between Toledo and Ann Arbor, and outlined plans to extend the track from Leland (and Worden) to South Lyon, then north through Wixom to Pontiac. The line was completed from Ann Arbor to South Lyon in late August 1881.

The Ann Arbor Railroad owners must have changed their construction plans soon after the track to South Lyon was completed, because they never completed the section to Wixom and Pontiac. Instead, they sold the incomplete South Lyon to Pontiac railroad right-of-way in 1882.

The South Lyon spur of the Ann Arbor Railroad was apparently never profitable.

Past total volunteer attempts have not been successful. This Student Internship Foundation will allow us to accomplish this task in a reasonable amount of time. Volunteers are still needed to work with Rachel. So, we are looking for volunteers to assist her in this effort. No experience is needed.
