In pursuance and by virtue of a decree in this cause bearing date the 17th day of December, A D., eighteen hundred and sixty, the undersigned Circuit Court Com-missioner for the County of Washtenaw and State of Michigan; will sell at public auction to the highest bidder at the front door of the Court House in the city of Ann Arbor, on Taesday, the sixteenth day of April next, at ten o'clock, in the foremoon of that day, the following described real estate, to wit :- All that certain tract or parcel of land known and described as follows: Being the west half of the south-west quarter of section num-ber twenty-three, (23); also the west half of the north west quarter of section number twenty-six, (28), in the township of Salem, County of Washtenaw and State of Michigan, containing one hundred and thirty four acres of land, be the same more or less, or so much thereof as may be necessary to satisfy the decree in this cause with interest and costs. ## **Excerpt from SAHS Publication**

Salem Area Historical Society Publication: Early Surveys in Salem By: Don Riddering Date: Historical Monograph No. III 1988

The mile roads in this part of Michigan should run east-west following the subdivision lines of the standard township, six miles by six miles square, with the base line on Eight Mile Road... Then why does Six Mile Road have so many curves from Salem Road west to Pontiac Trail? Or why does Salem Road change directions at Five Mile Road instead of running north-south as it should? These are supposed to be the north-south, east-west roads which would delineate equal sections of land in Salem Township. Are sections 19 through 24 really smaller than sections 13 through 18? Did the early settlers who bought a quarter section of land from the U.S. Government in section 21 receive less land than those who bought a quarter section in section 16? In reality, they actually had received fewer acres than they paid for at \$1.25 per acre, and they were angry with the situation, opening an interesting chapter in the history of Salem Township which lasted until 1850 and took place in the halls of our nation's capitol under several presidents.

The original survey of Township 1 South, Range 7 East (Salem Township) was made by Joseph Wampler, Deputy Surveyor of Tuscarawas County in Ohio. On August 7, 1815 a contract was signed by Edward Tiffin, Surveyor General in Cincinnati , and Joseph Wampler, Deputy Surveyor, "to establish corners for quarter sections in townships no. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the 7<sup>th</sup> Range and townships no. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 of the 8<sup>th</sup> Range East of the Principle Meridian and South of the Base Line in the Michigan Territory." This was a contract, then, for a total of 10 townships. …

Between August 7, 1815 and February 7, 1816, then, Joseph Wampler supposedly surveyed Salem Township along with the other 9 townships. This was one of the earliest surveys in Michigan because the contract for a survey of portions of "a base line (8 Mile Road) from a point above Detroit due west to the Indian Boundary" and "a true meridian line from Fort Defiance due North" was signed in April 1815. ....

Instead of the standard township of 6 miles by 6 miles, his original survey of Salem Township shows ... sections of 9/10 of a mile along the western edge. That 1/10 of a mile shortage was all taken from the west half of those sections. ...

By 1840 the problem of proper location and lot size had become acute. ... It is a story of ten years of political maneuvering as documented in official papers of the Senate of The United States. ...
