Market Tables from local vendors with a wide array of goods. Food, drinks and bake goods were available for




purchase.



Pub Note: This is the only known state of this map. It was issued as a separate map and also in "A New American Atlas, by Henry S. Tanner," (1839). In full color showing townships with canals in blue, railroads in red, and proposed railways in yellow. It is a pocket map but is lacking its covers.

Cwik's Note: This map was published fourteen years after the first land sale in Salem and two years after Michigan became a state. The shape of Lakes Michigan and Huron is close to the shape that we know today. The compromise that settled the "Michigan-Ohio" war is shown. See the Southern border of Michigan where Toledo is now part of Ohio and the fact that the Upper Peninsula is now part of the State of Michigan. Changes since the 1835 map are: 1.) Washtenaw County has become smaller and is as we know it today 2,) the 3 southern rows of counties are as we know them today, 3.) More counties were added to cover the entire Lower Peninsula and 4.) The County of Mackinaw spanned both peninsulas, 5.) The County of Menomonien spans into the Territory of Wisconsin and 6.) The western portion of the Upper Peninsula does not yet have a county government.

Sympathies of the Salem Area Historical Society are extended to the family of Olive Conant

Olive Anne Conant, age 95, passed away on September 28 after suffering a stroke in late August. She was born on March 16, 1913 in Mankato, Minnesota. In 1930, her family relocated from Mankato to Michigan to find work at the beginning of the Great Depression. She married Herbert Eugene Conant of Denton, Michigan on June 25, 1940.



In 1942, she and Herbert moved their State historic (1833) John Wesley Conant house to its present location on Napier Road near Plymouth, Michigan because its original location was appropriated for the Willow Run Bomber Plant to help in the World War II effort. Recently the entire farm was granted a Conservation Easement and was approved as a Washtenaw County historic site.

Olive and Herbert raised their family on the farm. They raised chickens for eggs, vegetables, and baking goods for sale at the Ann Arbor Farmers Market for many years. Olive served as part time Market Master there with Herbert in the early 1970s. She was active in the Salem Area Historical Society, Ypsilanti Seniors, Michigan Botanical Club and Michigan Herb Society, 4-H

and the St. Peters Evangelical Lutheran Church in Plymouth for many years.

Dickerson Barn Update

In October, Billy Kruse put together an effort to install the drain around the barn. With help from Doug DiPonio and Gilbert Terry, the task was accomplished over the weekend of October 11th. In addition to the drain, they completed the routing of the electrical line to the barn and the shaping of the land around the barn. It was a job well done and our thanks go to all involved and especially to Billy for leading this effort.

Also in October, SAHS contracted with McCauley and Sons to paint the Dickerson Barn a beautiful Barn Red. The paint, a quality Sherwin-Williams product, was donated by Sue Bejin and Mike Geary. They sprayed and rolled the entire exterior in time to have it complete for our first Country Antique Fair and Flea Market event.







Once again, Scout Troop #743 held a community service event at the SAHS site. This time, they worked in the Dickerson Barn on November 15th. They cleaned the crawl space below the floor, rearranged and laid the floor boards, sorted and stacked the extra floor boards and moved the "original Windy Acres" exterior sign siding to the loft. Thank you to the troop and the SAHS members that helped. SAHS still needs to raise the last of the funds to complete this project.







We are still short of funds to complete the windows, fence and the landscaping. We still need about \$3,000.

Jarvis-Stone School Update

In September, SAHS wrote and submitted two grant applications regarding the Renovation Project for the Front Room of the Jarvis-Stone School. The project to renovate this 1941 addition was divided into three phases with the goal of turning this area into a usable Restroom and an Entry Room with storage cabinets and countertops. A grant request for Phase I (\$2,978) was submitted to the Detroit Red Wings Foundation. They have not yet made their grant decisions. The second request to cover Phase II (\$2,174) was submitted to the Community Foundation of Plymouth through the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation. Following an interview process, SAHS was informed that our request was granted and that the Community Foundation of Plymouth will be awarding SAHS a grant of \$2,174.
