
Dinner/Auction in terms of attendance and fund raising. When adding up the funds generated from the banquet, auction, 50/50 and donations, we raised over

Pub Note: The first Cerographic Atlas of the United States. Originally Issued in three parts starting in 1842 and ending in 1845 (although Woodward states that it cannot be determined how many parts were issued, our copy indicates three parts), This copy is the 1845 edition, which is a reissue of the 1842 - 1845 edition with some changes to the maps and the addition of color. Library of Congress copy (Phillips, 1228) and this copy have no Oregon map and no separate map of Iowa, as issued. When the atlas was issued in parts (Phillips, 1383) there was an Oregon map and an Iowa map listed. However, this 1845 ed. adds 6 maps not in the 1st ed.: North America, Canada east, Canada west, Nova Scotia - New Brunswick &c., West India Islands, and Wisconsin Southern Part. Printed in full color. Bound in half leather floral textured brown cloth covered boards, titled "Morse's North American Atlas" in gilt. **Cwik's Note:** This map was published twenty years after the first land sale in Salem and eight years after Michigan became a state. The shapes of the Great Lakes that border Michigan are the shape that we know today. Changes since the 1839 map are: 1.) many more counties have been added to the northern portion of the Lower Peninsula, 2.) the Upper Peninsula is divided into 6 counties (Mackinac, Chippewa, Schoolcraft, Marquette, Delta and Ontonagon) and 3.) the border between Michigan and Wisconsin is better established but Michigan still has Washington and Detroit Islands at the mouth of Green Bay.

Michigan in Perspective: The Local History Conference

The 51st annual **Michigan in Perspective: the Local History Conference** will be held April 17-18, 2009 at the McGregor Conference Center on the Wayne State University campus. The conference was organized by the Michigan in Perspective Planning Committee and the lead sponsor and conference administrator is the Historical Society of Michigan. Other main sponsors include the Detroit Historical Society and the Detroit Public Library.

Several keynote and many breakout sessions are planned that focus on Detroit area history as well as sessions that focus more broadly on local history in Michigan. These include: **Sojourner Truth: One of Michigan's Most Famous Citizens** by Cornell University professor Margaret Washington, the **History of the Detroit** Symphony Orchestra by orchestra historian Paul Ganson, Detroit Mayor Kwame Kilpatrick: the Scandal that Rocked Detroit and the Region by Detroit Free Press reporter M.L. Elrick, and I've Got a Home in Glory Land: A Lost Tale of the Underground Railroad by Dalhousie University professor Karolyn Smardz Frost.

Breakout sessions include: Contributions of Plymouth Women in the Civil War, Forgotten Harvest: Ice Harvesting in Oakland County, Finding Family History in the Outhouse, 19th Century One-Room Schools in Michigan, A Brief History of the Underwater International Link (Detroit-Windsor Tunnel), The Book Cadillac, The Fort Shelby, Poles in Detroit, Chaldeans in Michigan, The History of Funeral and Mourning Customs, Lost Legends of the Lakes and Lake Erie's Great Mystery: the 335-foot Car Ferry Marquette and Bessemer #2.

You can pre-register by phone (800-692-1828) or online (<u>www.hsmichigan.org</u>) prior to April 10th. Walk-in registration is permitted. The cost for the conference registration is \$29 per individual.

The Conant Farm – Local Historic District

The Conant Farm has been designated a local historic district by the Washtenaw County Board of Commissioners. A 52-page report on The Conant Farm can be found at the SAHS Website: www.sahshistory.org. The Conant Farm is located at 5683 and 5671 Napier Road. The property consists of 70 acres of gently rolling fields and forested land. The historic farmstead is situated along the eastern end of the property. The buildings are grouped as an elongated cluster on a small rise that runs parallel to the road. At the northern end of the cluster are the Conant farmhouse, a log cabin, and an older outhouse. Near the center of the cluster are the Bowers-Walker farmhouse, brooder house, gazebo, milk house, garage and potting shed. South of these are a chicken coop, corn crib, silo and a large gambrel-roofed barn.

Eagle Scout Project

Once again, SAHS has been fortunate to have an Eagle Scout Candidate select us as the recipient of his Eagle Scout Project. Stephen has developed his project to build a split rail fence from the Dickerson Barn to our property border in two places that will secure the Northwest corner of our property. Each section of the fence will run from one corner of the Dickerson Barn to our property border for a length of about 50 feet. Stephen is projecting a May or June completion of his project.
