Friday, April 17th thru Saturday, May 2nd,
 Liberty Awakes in Washtenaw County:
 When Women Won the Vote Exhibit at Salem - South Lyon District Library

In 1920, the Nineteenth amendment was ratified by 36 states – including Michigan – thus making it a constitutional right for women across the nation to vote. This commemorative exhibit recognizes the individuals and groups in Washtenaw County who raised their voices and aired their views about expanding voting rights to women. This national quarrel, which began in the mid-19th century, created a social movement known as Women's Suffrage. This exhibit is sponsored by the Salem Area Historical Society and the League of Women Voters of the Ann Arbor Area and is hosted by the Salem - South Lyon District Library.


organizing this dedication.

Marcia Van Fossen has once again lined up an interesting set of topics for us in 2020. See Page 3. Next year is the Centennial celebration of the passage of the 19th Amendment, which granted the privilege of voting to women. You will note that this is a reoccurring topic for our

2020 meetings. The April Meeting topic (Dangerous Experiment) is about the opening up of educational opportunities to women of Southeastern Michigan. The May Meeting topic addresses the clothing of women of that era. The September Meeting directly addresses the topic of Women's Suffrage with emphasis on the activities in Michigan. Also on this topic, I have worked with the League of Women Voters of the Ann Arbor Area for the SAHS to host an

Recap of Recent SAHS Events

SAHS Annual Dinner/ Auction

On Saturday, **April 6th** in the Classic Log Cabin Clubhouse at Fox Hills Golf and Banquet Center, 42 supporters of SAHS attended the Dinner/Auction and purchased 80 auction items. As has been the case for the past 11 years, this was once again the largest fund raiser for the SAHS with a net of \$5.067.15.

SAHS April Meeting

On Wednesday, **April 24th**, at the South Salem Stone School, SAHS held a membership meeting with two presentations: "South Salem Stone School Oral History Project" by Shannon Wilson and "Prisons in Plymouth & Northville" by Joe Oldenburg. Shannon completed the oral history project in 2019. Historian and archivist Joe Oldenburg presented the story of the only prison in Michigan for "women only" from the 1860s into the 1970s and its successor, Scott Correctional Facility, which finally closed in 2009. These presentations were well received by the 17 attendees.

Trinkets to Treasures Yard Sale

On Saturday, **May 18th**, the Salem Area Historical Society's Trinkets to Treasures Yard Sale Presented By Advanced Disposal was held on the grounds of the Jarvis Stone School Historic District. This year's event was led by Sue DiMilia and had flea market tables and yard sale items. The SAHS netted \$739.18 for its general operating fund.

SAHS May Meeting

On Wednesday, May 22nd, at the South Salem Stone School during the SAHS Membership meeting, the SAHS Membership passed a change to the SAHS By-Laws with regard to the required qualifications for a nominee to the SAHS Board. Also, George Taylor presented a program on "Cobblestone Farm" to 13 attendees.

SAHS June Meeting

On Wednesday, June **26**th, at the South Salem Stone School, SAHS held a membership meeting where 9 SAHS members enjoyed a review of the world travels of their fellow members (Sue DiMilia, Cindy Brautigan, and Terry Cwik) ala George Pierrot's World Adventure Series.

Arts & Crafts Fair

On Saturday, **August 17th**, the Salem Area Historical Society's Arts & Crafts Fair Presented By Advanced Disposal was held on the grounds of the Jarvis Stone School Historic District. This year's event was led by Sue DiMilia and included a Bake Sale in the school. The Fair had 21 vendors, who experienced a steady flow of customers and SAHS netted \$1,765.04 for its general operating fund, breaking last year's record as best total yet for this event.



Veterans' Dedication

On Saturday, August 17th, at the beginning of the SAHS's Arts & Crafts Fair, there was a Dedication for War of 1812 and Civil War Veterans buried in the Salem Cemeteries of Olds, Worden, and Lapham. One War of 1812 and five Civil War soldiers were honored and each had a grave marker placed next to his tombstones in three Salem cemeteries—Lapham, Olds, and Worden. The research to confirm their service was conducted by the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) Camp 180, who also perform the dedication ceremony. The ceremony featured a bugler, readings, prayers, a story about each veteran being honored and a multi-gun salute. The solders honored were: John Parks (War of 1812-Olds), James D. Hood (CW-Olds), Harvey C. Packard (CW-Lapham), Newell Withee (CW-Lapham), William Huston "Will" Sweet (CW-Worden), and Philip Terry (CW-Worden).

On Wednesday, **September 25**th, SAHS held a General Membership Meeting followed by a presentation about "Dodge Brothers" by Russell Doré. Russell explained their lives from humble beginnings to a world of mansions and yachts, how the company survived following their untimely deaths within months of each other, why Walter Chrysler acquired the company, and how Dodge products became a key part of Chrysler and FC Automobiles, and the Dodge family involvement with Meadowbrook Hall, the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and Oakland University. This talk drew a crowd of 15 SAHS Members and 8 guests.

October Meeting

On Wednesday, October 23rd, after a general membership meeting, ten SAHS members and seven non-member attendees listened to a presentation about "Washtenaw County Barns" by Chuck Bultman, a practicing architect. He focused on current preservation efforts and considerations for old barns; particularly some of the old barns of Washtenaw County. Chuck explained the kinds of barns we have and the condition in which we find them. Also, he told us about what our choices are to keep them and what some of the struggles are with respect to our laws and codes regarding buildings / farms.

Lincoln's Thanksgiving Proclamation - October 3, 1863 - By the President of the United States

The year that is drawing toward its close has been filled with the blessings of fruitful fields and healthful skies. To these bounties, which are so constantly enjoyed that we are prone to forget the source from which they come, others have been added, which are of so extraordinary a nature that they cannot fail to penetrate and soften the heart which is habitually insensible to the ever-watchful providence of Almighty God.

In the midst of a civil war of unequaled magnitude and severity, which has sometimes seemed to foreign states to invite and provoke their aggressions, peace has been preserved with all nations, order has been maintained, the laws have been respected and obeyed, and harmony has prevailed everywhere, except in the theater of military conflict; while that theater has been greatly contracted by the advancing armies and navies of the Union.

Needful diversions of wealth and of strength from the fields of peaceful industry to the national defense have not arrested the plow, the shuttle, or the ship; the ax has enlarged the borders of our settlements, and the mines, as well of iron and coal as of the precious metals, have yielded even more abundantly than heretofore. Population has steadily increased, notwithstanding the waste that has been made in the camp, the siege, and the battlefield, and the country, rejoicing in the consciousness of augmented strength and vigor, is permitted to expect continuance of years with large increase of freedom.

No human counsel hath devised, nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy.

It has seemed to me fit and proper that they should be solemnly, reverently, and gratefully acknowledged as with one heart and one voice by the whole American people. I do, therefore, invite my fellow-citizens in every part of the United States, and also those who are at sea and those who are sojourning in foreign lands, to set apart and observe the last Thursday of November next as a Day of Thanksgiving and Praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens. And I recommend to them that, while offering up the ascriptions justly due to Him for such singular deliverances and blessings, they do also, with humble penitence for our national perverseness and disobedience, commend to His tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners, or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife in which we are unavoidably engaged, and fervently implore the interposition of the Almighty hand to heal the wounds of the nation, and to restore it, as soon as may be consistent with the Divine purposes, to the full enjoyment of peace, harmony, tranquility, and union.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United Stated States to be affixed.

Done at the city of Washington, this third day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-eighth.
