A short SAHS Business Meeting will be followed by a presentation of "Women's Suffrage" by Susan Nenadic.

Susan Nenadic is the author of A Purse of her Own: Occupations of Nineteenth Century Women and Legendary Locals of Ann Arbor as well as many articles. Susan provides programs throughout Michigan and teaches adult learning classes. She is a former board member of the Washtenaw County Historical Society for which she was in charge of museum exhibitions.

But it had been a long and arduous road full of difficulties. The Seneca Falls Convention in 1848 laid the foundation. The goal was not just the vote. Equal rights included women's rights to property, income, and children. For 72 years, American suffragists fought against social prejudices and each other.

Salem Area Historical Society Archive Database Project

In the Archival Project, we are still sorting through the society's records and grouping them into specific categories. Also, we are working with the EMU Historic Preservation Department's grad student, Alex Whydell, to digitize individual documents and add them to the SAHS Archive Database. Excerpt from SAHS Publication

Salem Area Historical Society Publication: Salem Walker Church and Cemetery

The history of the country church at the corner of Angle Road and Tower Road begins with the Methodist Episcopal Mission Circuit out of Plymouth in 1834-35. Marcus Swift and Lorenzo Davis were the circuit riders to cover the nine appointments around the circuit including three stops in Salem Township, Worden (Five Mile Road at Pontiac Trail), Lampham's Corners (Brookville Road at Salem Road), and at another location just called "Salem" on the map (Not in the present village which did not exist until 1873.), probably in someone's home. Swift and Davis reported 411 members in the circuit.

From "Early History of the Methodist Church in South Lyon" we know that "an exhorter from Plymouth, James Jessop" had arrived in South Lyon in 1833. By 1836 the first "protected meetings" were help, "resulting in some forty converts." These meetings were held in various homes and in a school house. In 1842 the first permanent Methodist Episcopal Church was built in South Lyon.

By 1854 South Lyon Methodist Episcopal Church also had circuits and stations. In the annual report of 1855 South Lyon listed 2 churches (Probably including New Hudson). In 1861 the annual report of South Lyon listed three churches. This third church was probably the church organization in Salem. An historical sketch of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Salem written in 1881 states, "The perfection of this church organization was brought about by the earnest efforts of Elder Anderson, who was then preaching on this circuit. Reverends Charles Miller Anderson was assigned to the church in South Lyon in 1861 and apparently organized some of the members on his circuit in Salem into a church, probably holding meeting in members' homes.

The building itself for this group was not erected until 1864, the year of the dedication by Elder Joseph S. Castor who was then associated with South Lyon.

This date, 1864, is confirmed by the deed registered May 1, 1865 in the Washtenaw County Registry of Deeds but signed on February 18, 1864. It is a bill of sale for "a half acre of land more or less" for \$5.00 from Carlisle and Mary Ann Ham to "James B. Van Atta, Anthony M. Farley, Lorenzo D. Perkins, Wm. Hollingshead, Ashley Root, John V. King and John C. Ingalls trustees in trust for the use and purpose hereinafter mentioned", which is defined as "for the purpose of a church site in trust that they shall erect and build or cause to be erected and built thereon a house or place of worship for the use of the members of The Methodist Episcopal Church." … The church was built in 1864 and dedicated that same year by Elder Castor. There is no documentation concerning the design of the building. …

It is clear from the property description of the land purchase for the church that the burial ground pre-dates the church building. The earliest burial listed in the cemetery records was that of Amina Bennett who died September 15, 1834 at the age of eight years. ...
